## THE LORD WELCOMES ALL

All of us who ache to be accepted find lavish comfort in today's readings. Rich in mercy, the Lord welcomes all of us—no exceptions. Isaiah extends God's invitation to all nations, even to foreigners who often arouse suspicion from the "in crowd." Saint Paul takes advantage of these fearful suspicions by provoking the Israelites' jealousy: if even Gentiles can offer acceptable worship to the one true God, then God's chosen people should surely do the same. In a similar way, Jesus provokes his disciples in today's Gospel from Matthew. Bantering with a Canaanite woman, Jesus draws out her tremendous faith, which endures despite the typical rejection she faces from scornful Israelites. Whether we identify more with the privileged disciples or the marginalized Canaanite woman, we cannot mistake God's universal invitation to believe in the One who saves us.

## REJECTED

At one time or another, we have all been rejected or ridiculed, left out of a conversation, or not invited to a party. It hurts to be excluded. God makes all things new, though, and our scriptures today invite us to turn over our aching hearts to the Lord. Some of us might feel reluctant to give our hearts to the Lord, especially if our suffering somehow involves God or the Church. Why pour out hearts to God, after all, if God seems to be the cause of our troubles? A tragic loss, a painful death, or an unavoidable catastrophe can disrupt or destroy our life plans. When people clumsily console us then, saying, "It's God's will," we can easily become suspicious of God and the almighty will. If we suffer from the sinful structures or actions of God's representatives and ministers in the Church, we might look with skepticism at the prayers of that same Church.

Even so, our Canaanite woman today persuades us not to lose hope. The disciples scorn her, complaining that she "keeps calling" out for help. Like irritable children, the disciples ask Jesus to "send her away." And just when we might expect Jesus to take her side, to scold the disciples and reward the woman's persistence, he shocks us by implying she is a dog. Undaunted, the woman accepts Jesus' remark and parlays its aggression into her own forceful plea: "Please, Lord, for even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters."

## ACCEPTED

The woman's faith is irresistible—to Jesus, and to us. Jesus grants her heart's desire, healing her daughter from that very moment. We too are won over by her indomitable confidence in the Lord. Truly, this woman is one of the heroes of the New Testament. When difficulties suffocate us and we feel turned away like a stray dog, we can recall the Canaanite woman's simple words: "Lord, help me."

That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

**Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits:** Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.

## The Queenship of Mary

I find it interesting that on August 22<sup>nd</sup>, exactly a week after we celebrate the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we celebrate the Queenship of Mary. In fact, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast day of the Queenship of Mary in 1954, only four years after declaring the dogmatic belief that Mary was assumed body and soul into heaven. Our belief in the Assumption leads in a natural way to our celebration of Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth.

When Mary was assumed into heaven she was exalted as Queen of Heaven and Earth. In this way she is more fully conformed to her son who is King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Reflecting on Christ's kingship, therefore, leads us to understand Mary's Queenship. Our Lord came not to be served, but to serve and give his life as a ransom for many (Mt 20:28). Mary, who called herself "the handmaid of the Lord" at the Annunciation remained faithful to being a true servant and disciple of Jesus, keeping all that he said and did in her heart. She was a faithful mother to her son all the way to the foot of the cross. She became the first of those disciples who with all humility and patience led their brothers and sisters to the King.

But to serve Christ is to reign with him. Her perfect freedom to serve her son and all humankind is completely compatible with her royal exaltation in heaven. And now that she is there, she like her son, the King "does not cease her service for the sake of our salvation" as Pope John Paul II wrote in his encyclical, *Redemptoris Mater*. Mary is powerful in protecting us and helping us through big and small miracles. She helps us grow in holiness and always points the way to Jesus. She helps to form us into the person God has created us to be gently loving us and molding us as we ask for her intercession.

This fifth mystery of the Holy Rosary is affirmed in the rosary itself, but also through prayers like the "Hail Holy Queen" and scripture verses such as Rev. 12:1 which speaks of a woman with a crown of twelve stars upon her head, adorned with the sun and the moon at her feet. I look forward to our May Crowning this next year! In any case we continue to approach our tender queen and mother in heaven and say together "Hail Mary, pray for us."

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

## EL SEÑOR DA LA BIENVENIDA A TODOS

Todos los que ansiamos ser aceptados encontramos mucho consuelo en las lecturas de hoy. Rico en misericordia, el Señor nos da la bienvenida a todos, sin excepciones. Isaías extiende la invitación de Dios a todas las naciones, incluso a los extranjeros que a menudo despiertan las sospechas de los pueblo privilegiado. San Pablo se aprovecha de estas temibles sospechas provocando los celos de los israelitas: si incluso los gentiles pueden ofrecer una adoración aceptable al único Dios verdadero, entonces el pueblo elegido de Dios seguramente debe hacer lo mismo. De manera similar, Jesús provoca a sus discípulos en el Evangelio de hoy de Mateo. Bantering con una mujer cananea, Jesús saca su tremenda fe, que perdura a pesar del típico rechazo que enfrenta de los israelitas desdeñosos. Ya sea que nos identifiquemos más con los discípulos privilegiados o con la mujer cananea marginada, no podemos confundir la invitación universal de Dios de creer en Aquel que nos salva.

### RECHAZADA

Ya sea una u otra vez, hemos experimentado el rechazo o el ridículo, haber sido ignorado en alguna conversación o no nos han invitado a algún festejo o fiesta. Duele ser excluido. Dios hace todas las cosas nuevas; sin embargo, las Escrituras hoy nos invitan a volver al Señor nuestros corazones lastimados. Algunos de nosotros podemos sentirnos de mala gana dar nuestros corazones al Señor, especialmente si nuestro sufrimiento puede involucrar a Dios o a la Iglesia. ¿Por qué derramar nuestro corazón a Dios, después de todo, si Dios parece ser la causa de nuestros problemas? Una trágica perdida, una muerte dolorosa, una catástrofe inevitable puede interrumpir o destruir nuestros planes de vida. Cuando las personas torpemente nos consuelan diciendo: “es la voluntad de Dios”, podemos fácilmente desconfiar de Dios y de su voluntad. Si sufrimos de las acciones pecaminosas de los representantes de Dios y ministros de la Iglesia, podemos ver con escepticismo las oraciones de la Iglesia.

Más aún, la mujer cananita de hoy nos persuade a no perder la fe. Los discípulos la hacen sentir menos, quejándose que ella “sigue pidiendo” ayuda. Como niños irritables, los discípulos piden a Jesús que “la eche”. Y cuando podemos esperar que Jesús esté de lado de ella, que haga sentir menos a los discípulos y recompense la persistencia de la mujer, él simplemente nos deja perplejos implicando que ella es como un perrito. Impávidamente la mujer acepta las palabras de Jesús y aumenta esa agresión hacia ella con una petición más fuerte: “pero también los perritos se comen las migajas que caen de la mesa de sus amos”.

### ACEPTADA

La fe de la mujer es irresistible, para Jesús y para nosotros. Jesús le concede lo que su corazón le pide, sanando a su hija en ese mismo momento. Nosotros también ganamos por su indomable confianza en el Señor. Verdaderamente esta mujer es una de las protagonistas del Nuevo Testamento. Cuando las dificultades nos sofocan y nos sentimos como perros callejeros deambulando, podemos recordar las sencillas palabras de la mujer cananita: “¡Señor, ayúdame!”

**¿POR QUÉ REZAR?**

Los “extranjeros” que Isaías menciona, los “gentiles” de que habla Pablo, o los “cananeos” que cita Mateo son llamados a adorar en oración al verdadero Dios. Al escuchar las lecturas de hoy, tal vez nos sintamos tentados a preguntarnos: ¿Por qué rezar? Es una pregunta retórica; se equipara a preguntar por qué han de hablarse los amigos o los enamorados besarse. Rezar es una manera de relacionarnos con Dios, una manera de hablarle. Los apóstoles tuvieron la oportunidad de conversar en persona con Jesús encarnado. Nosotros tenemos la oportunidad de hablar con Dios en la oración. Nuestra relación con él debe ser entusiasta; no puede ser púsiláime. John Donne, un poeta y sacerdote inglés del siglo XV, supo cuáles eran las cualidades de una buena oración. Donne le pide a Dios que lo trate de manera diferente que a la mayoría de los cristianos. Él poeta no quiere que Dios meramente “golpee, aliente, brille y repare”, sino que también “rompa, sople, quemé y me haga nuevo” (Holy Sonnets, XIV).

Se requiere una fe dinámica de nuestra parte para venir a Dios en oración. Como dijo Jesús una vez: “Toca a la puerta y se te abrirá” (Mateo 7:7). Tal vez requiera golpear la puerta hasta tumbarla, pero si perseveramos al igual que la mujer del Evangelio de hoy, veremos los resultados. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.


**Evangelio**

**Mt 15, 21–28**

En aquel tiempo, Jesús se retiró a la comarca de Tiro y Sidón. Entonces una mujer cananea le salió al encuentro y se puso a gritar: “Señor, hijo de David, ten compasión de mí. Mi hija está terriblemente atormentada por un demonio”. Jesús no le contestó una sola palabra; pero los discípulos se acercaron y le rogaban: “Atiéndela, porque viene gritando detrás de nosotros”. Él les contestó: “Yo no he sido enviado sino a las ovejas descarriadas de la casa de Israel”.

Ella se acercó entonces a Jesús y postrada ante él, le dijo: “¡Señor, ayúdame!” Él le respondió: “No está bien quitarles el pan a los hijos para echárselo a los perros”.
