Mass Intentions: Mass intentions may be for the living and/or the departed, with a † designating in the bulletin a deceased person. There is a \$10 suggested donation per Mass intention. Permission from the sick person or his/her family must be granted before a name's inclusion in these prayers. To schedule a Mass intention, call the Parish Office.

Baptism: Sacramental preparation is required for all parents. Godparents and Grandparents are also encouraged to attend. Baptismal prep sessions are given every other month and Baptism Masses are held once a month. Call the Parish Office to schedule a child for Baptism and the parents for baptismal prep.

Penance: Saturdays at Guardian Angels or by appointment.

Matrimony: Pre-registration required at least one year in advance; marriage preparation course is required. Initial contact: 952-227-4000, or e-mail: info@GACHaska.org.

Anointing: If you wish to receive an anointing please call the Parish Office: (952) 227-4000 .

Communion for the Homebound: When we come together to pray at our Eucharistic liturgy, we do not forget the members of our community who are unable to be with us because of ill health. We remember them in our prayers, and we wish to include them in our Holy Communion. Members of our community bring the Blessed Sacrament to them to comfort them and to unite us in the Eucharist. We are not always aware of those who have this need. Please call the Parish Office to let us know if you or a member of your family would like to have Holy Communion brought to them. That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits: Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.

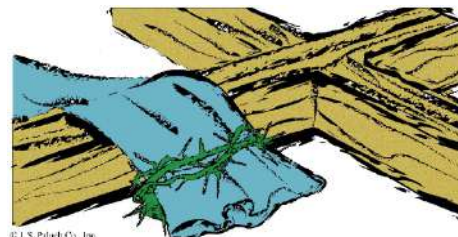

HUMILDAD

El beato Giles de Asís, en el siglo XIII, escribió: "Nadie puede alcanzar el conocimiento de Dios, sino por humildad. La forma de montar en lo alto es descender." Esto ayuda a expresar la profunda verdad de las lecturas de hoy. En opinión de Ezequiel, sólo los humildes pueden reconocer la culpa y volverse a Dios con arrepentimiento. En el Evangelio de Mateo, aquellos que se ven humildemente son capaces de reconocer la presencia de Dios en Jesús. Y en su carta a los filipenses, el conmovedor himno de san Pablo cuenta la historia de Jesús, quien con su humildad nos mostró lo más profundo del amor de Dios. Jesucristo es exaltado como Señor precisamente por su humildad y servicio a Dios. En nuestras propias parroquias y comunidades de fe, al igual que la comunidad cristiana de Filipo, estamos llamados a seguir el camino de Jesús, y a vivir con humildad y al servicio el uno al otro.

¿CON QUÉ AUTORIDAD?

El Evangelio de hoy describe la segunda mitad de un argumento entre Jesús y los sumos sacerdotes y los ancianos del pueblo. Le preguntaron: ¿con qué autoridad haces estas cosas? Mucho de esta discusión fue acerca de la autoridad. ¿Cómo era posible que Jesús dijera que representaba los propósitos de Dios? Esta pregunta sigue escuchándose hasta el día de hoy. ¿Quién habla por Dios? ¿Quién no lo hace? ¿Cómo podemos diferenciarlos?

La respuesta de Jesús es ver a la evidencia. Miren cómo, en respuesta a Juan el Bautista y a Jesús, las personas son sanadas del cuerpo y el alma. Miren cómo las personas encontraron una nueva intimidad con Dios, y cómo cambiaron sus vidas de pecado. La autoridad de Juan y Jesús reposa no en algunos puestos de las instituciones religiosas, sino en la gracia y evidente fuerza sanadora de Juan y Jesús.

CAMBIANDO LA MENTE

Hoy las lecturas ponen claro que para ser un seguidor de Jesús uno tiene que cambiar la mente. Más precisamente, debemos permitir que Dios nos cambie, transforme nuestras mentes. Para muchos de nosotros, esto puede ser verdaderamente difícil. Es por esto que las lecturas hablan mucho acerca de la humildad. La humildad abre nuestra capacidad para ser transformados. La humildad nos permite cambiar nuestra forma de pensar y nuestro comportamiento, para así poder evitar por un lado la auto justificación, y por otro lado la auto denigración.

La humildad puede cultivarse en la práctica de la reflexión. Esto podría significar dedicar un tiempo específico a Dios dentro de nuestra ocupada lista de las afanosas obligaciones. Esto podría significar dedicar un tiempo específico para un retiro de un día de tranquilidad, quizá con la ayuda de un director espiritual.

La humildad también puede cultivarse en obras de servicio. Conocemos de la humildad de Jesús en el lavatorio de pies. Podemos poner nuestros intereses por delante de los nuestros, y renunciamos a nuestra necesidad de estar en control. Cuando cultivamos la humildad, creamos un espacio dentro de nosotros para permitir que Dios haga su morada en nosotros y nos transforme.
