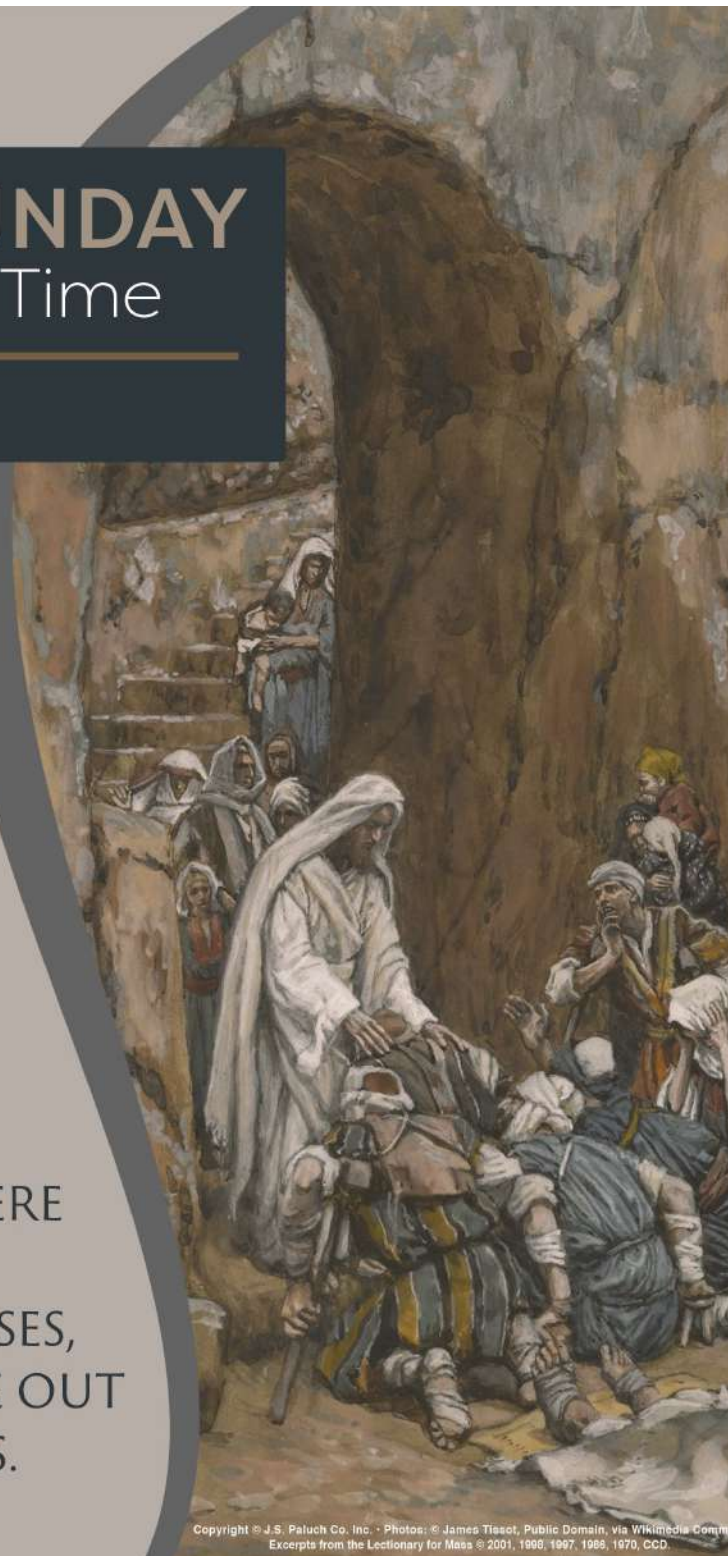

Mass Intentions: Mass intentions may be for the living and/or the departed, with a † designating in the bulletin a deceased person. There is a \$10 suggested donation per Mass intention. Permission from the sick person or his/her family must be granted before a name's inclusion in these prayers. To schedule a Mass intention, call the Parish Office.

Baptism: Sacramental preparation is required for all parents. Godparents and Grandparents are also encouraged to attend. Baptismal prep sessions are given every other month and Baptism Masses are held once a month. Call the Parish Office to schedule a child for Baptism and the parents for baptismal prep.

Anointing: If you wish to receive an anointing please call the Parish Office: (952) 227-4000.

Communion for the Homebound: When we come together to pray at our Eucharistic liturgy, we do not forget the members of our community who are unable to be with us because of ill health. We remember them in our prayers, and we wish to include them in our Holy Communion. Members of our community bring the Blessed Sacrament to them to comfort them and to unite us in the Eucharist. We are not always aware of those who have this need. Please call the Parish Office to let us know if you or a member of your family would like to have Holy Communion brought to them. That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits: Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.

FROM THE PASTOR

Jesus Is Alive With His Healing Touch and Words Today

When you go to the Holy Land, you can visit Capernaum. On the shore of the Sea of Galilee, you can visit the city which was rediscovered by archaeological digging, and is a popular destination among pilgrims visiting there. This is where Jesus stayed after leaving his home village of Nazareth and where he began teaching Peter and the other disciples. Among the excavations there, the beautiful synagogue stands out. Jesus preached there and this is where he healed the sick and freed the possessed through exorcism. Here he spoke those unforgettable words about being the “bread of life” and that he would give his people his flesh to eat: the holy Eucharist.

It makes a deep impression when you realize he was actually there and that right next to it was Peter’s house, according to an old tradition. Now, a modern church is built over the site, but you can still see the house underneath. The gospel is not a fairy tale, but rather an account of the real events of Jesus Christ. We learn from this real event that real people saw him and heard him. But they also experienced his touch and his commanding power. He took a little girl by the hand and said, “Little girl, get up!” and she got up. He touched and cured many who had so many different ailments. Now, he touches our hearts today through the sacraments, transforming our hearts, so that we may acknowledge him as the Son of God. In this way through faith, we can experience his touch and receive the power of his grace.

But Jesus did not take the way of success. The very next day, he left, first for silence and prayer, and then to carry on his work in other towns and villages. Why should he not come as far as us, right into the place that we live, and into our homes? The gospel story can happen where we live. Jesus can come into my home, and “take by the hand and lift up” me or one of my loved ones, whoever particularly needs it. We do well to go away for a while like he did to pray, even if we should be told after a short time, “Everyone is looking for you.” We need only to trust and ask for his healing touch, as Simon Peter did then on his mother-in-law’s behalf.

Reading 2

1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23

Brothers and sisters: If I preach the gospel, this is no reason for me to boast, for an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!

If I do so willingly, I have a recompense, but if unwillingly, then I have been entrusted with a stewardship.

What then is my recompense? That, when I preach, I offer the gospel free of charge so as not to make full use of my right in the gospel. Although I am free in regard to all, I have made myself a slave to all so as to win over as many as possible. To the weak I became weak, to win over the weak. I have become all things to all, to save at least some.

All this I do for the sake of the gospel,
so that I too may have a share in it.

Gospel

Mk 1:29-39

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon's mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them.

When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him.

Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you." He told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come." So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

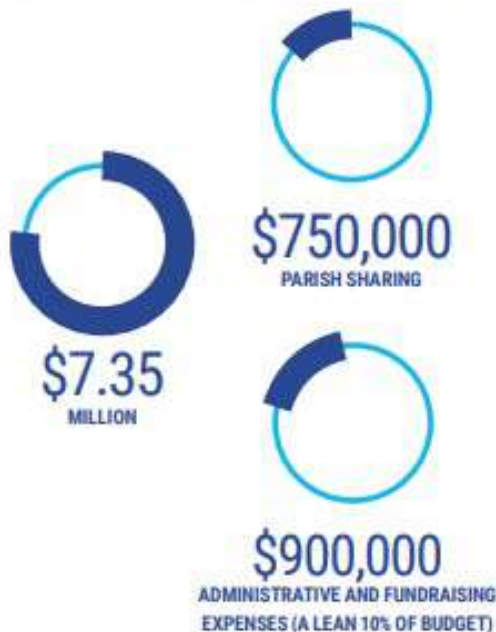

Mk 1, 29-39

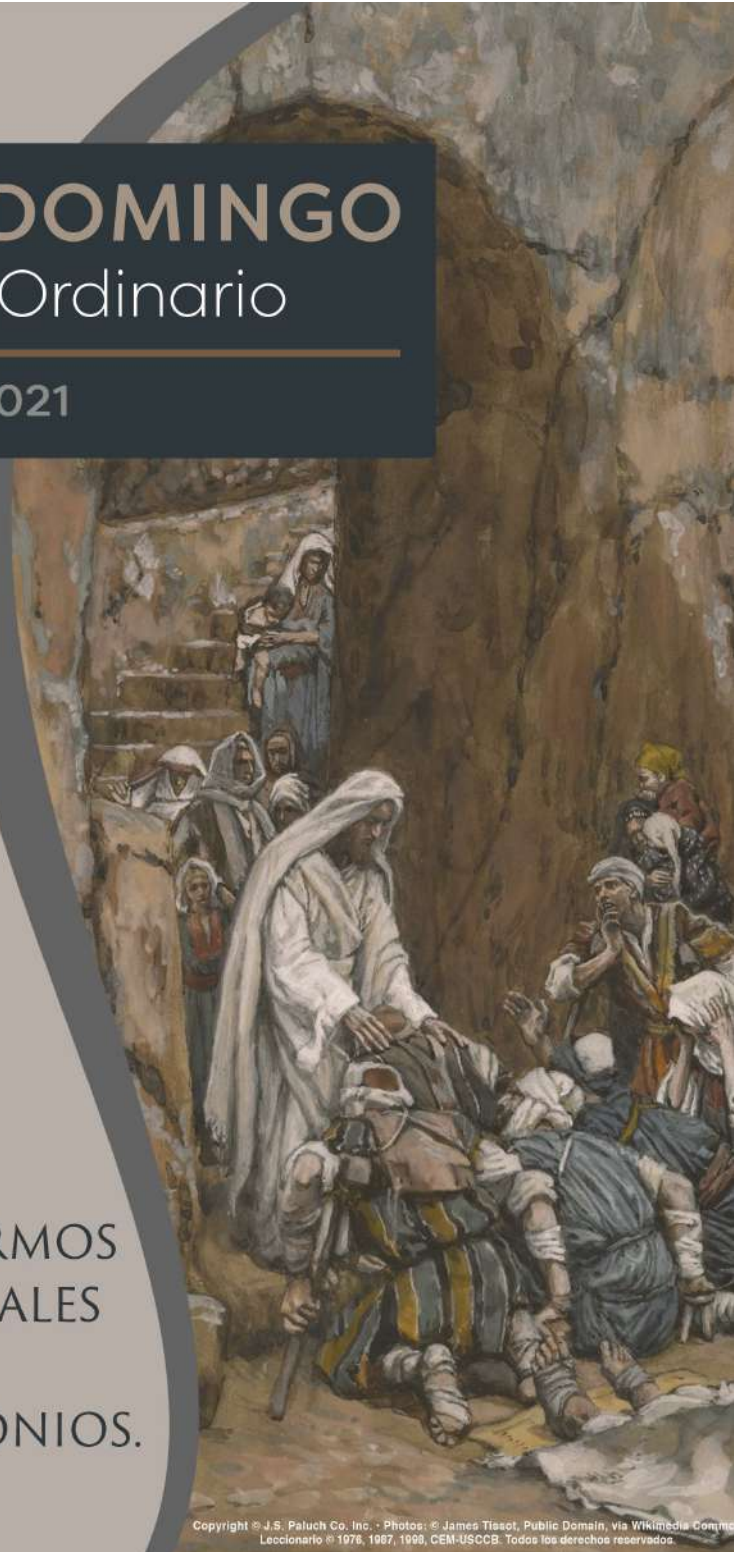
