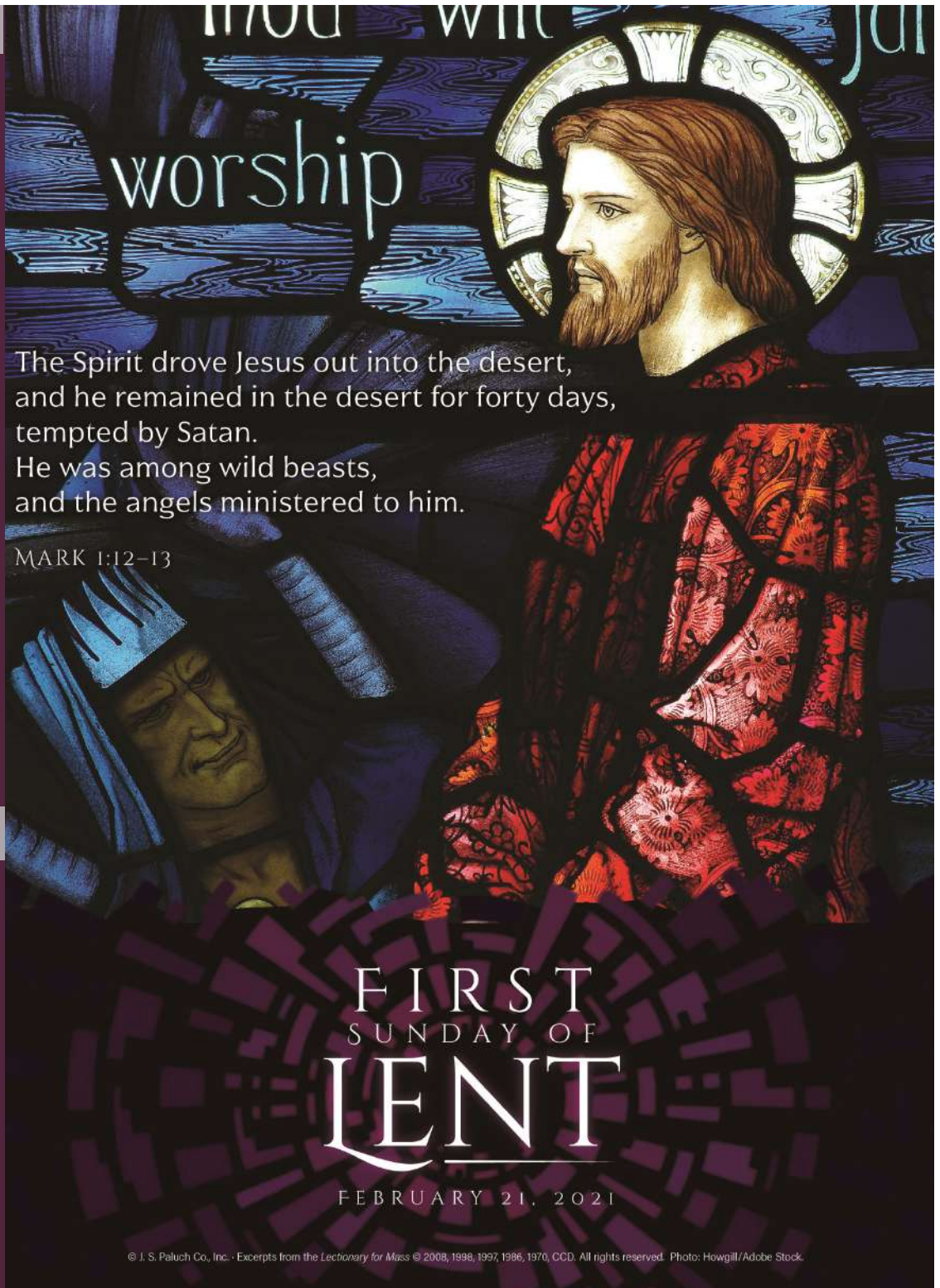

Anointing: If you wish to receive an anointing please call the Parish Office: (952) 227-4000.

Communion for the Homebound: When we come together to pray at our Eucharistic liturgy, we do not forget the members of our community who are unable to be with us because of ill health. We remember them in our prayers, and we wish to include them in our Holy Communion. Members of our community bring the Blessed Sacrament to them to comfort them and to unite us in the Eucharist. We are not always aware of those who have this need. Please call the Parish Office to let us know if you or a member of your family would like to have Holy Communion brought to them. That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits: Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.

FROM THE PASTOR

The Wilderness Blossoms

Mark the Evangelist devotes only a few lines to Jesus' forty days in the wilderness. These forty days are the model for our forty days of Lent. What did Jesus intend with his time in the wilderness? What was it like for him? What is it about this story that we are meant to imitate? The words are sparing, but they are densely packed with content.

First, we see that Jesus had just had himself baptized in the Jordan River by John the Baptizer. Before this, he had lived an ordinary life as an artisan. He suddenly left all of this and simply lined up with all of the people who were coming to confess their sins and be baptized by John. Right from the start, Jesus set himself in the midst of the people. "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I came not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mk 2:17) was the way he would later explain his task. And that is what the people were: sinners, sick in body and soul. His task was to make them well again and mere talking would be of no help. Jesus went to the root of the evil. That was why he went into the wilderness, where God's spirit drove him.

The wilderness is hard to endure. There is no entertainment, no fun. There is only silence and solitude. And Jesus was tempted by Satan besides. There are sexual allurements today and other ways of continually satisfying the body with food and drink. There are also temptations to boasting, being in control or glory. And finally there is the ultimate temptation of turning away from God.

How did Jesus endure these temptations? We do not know, but we know that he did on our behalf. He took our struggle upon himself. He can heal us and help us only if he knows this struggle with the Tempter and he was victorious over it.

Mark shows us this victory by two signs. First, he lived among the wild beasts and yet they did not harm him. There is peace among them because he is at peace with God. Second, the angels administered to Jesus. This is an image of peace with the heavenly realm. Because Jesus has overcome evil and the devil, peace emanates from him. The wilderness becomes a place of peace.

Jesus wants us to experience his peace in our wilderness! He exhorts us to turn to him again, to believe in the gospel, and to put it into practice in our lives in its fullest measure again.

What are the regulations for penance, fasting and abstinence during Lent?

Penitential days – The penitential days for the universal Church are each Friday of the whole year and the season of Lent. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes with the celebration of the Paschal Triduum. During this time the whole Church is invited to do penance in order to purify our hearts in preparation to celebrate the renewal of our baptismal promises on Easter Sunday. The following regulations should be observed by Catholics during Lent:

Abstinence – Catholics 14 years of age and older must abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent. It is only on other Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, that a Catholic may substitute another form of penance instead of abstinence.

Fasting – Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these days one full meal is allowed. Food may be taken at two other times during the day, in order to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. Liquids, including milk and fruit juices, are allowed, however.

Sacrament of Penance – All the faithful who have reached the age of reason (second grade) are bound faithfully to confess their grave sins at least once a year. Lent is a good time to fulfill this precept of the Church. Anyone who is aware of having committed a mortal sin must not receive Holy Communion without previously having been to sacramental confession (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1457). Of course, frequent confession, even of venial sins, is highly recommended to grow in God's grace (CCC, #1458).

Other Lenten Observances – Each weekday of Lent, with the exception of Solemnities, is also an obligatory day of penance and should be marked by prayer and increased devotion to spiritual practices. Some recommendations to fulfill this obligation include the participation in daily Mass, increased personal prayer time or spiritual study, self-imposed fasting or abstinence, works of charity, financial generosity to programs which benefit others, especially the poor, and participation in traditional Lenten Devotions (Stations of the Cross, Rosary, Retreats, Parish Missions, etc.).

The goal of all our Lenten disciplines is the conversion of our hearts. As the Catechism states, however, "interior conversion urges expression in visible signs, gestures and works of penance" (CCC, #1430). These penances help us to "repent" as the Lord asks, by redirecting our whole life

Reading 2

In it he also went to preach to the spirits in prison, who had once been disobedient while God patiently waited in the days of Noah during the building of the ark, in which a few persons, eight in all, were saved through water. This prefigured baptism, which saves you now. It is not a removal of dirt from the body but an appeal to God for a clear conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers subject to him.

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: “This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel.”

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Regulaciones para la penitencia, el ayuno y la abstinencia durante la Cuaresma

Días de penitencia: los días de penitencia para la iglesia universal son todos los viernes del año y durante el tiempo de Cuaresma. La Cuaresma comienza el Miércoles de Cenizas y termina con la celebración del Triduo Pascual. Durante este tiempo, toda la Iglesia está invitada a hacer penitencia para purificar nuestros corazones y prepararnos para celebrar la renovación de nuestras promesas bautismales el domingo de Pascua.

Las siguientes, son las regulaciones que los Católicos deben observar durante la Cuaresma:

Abstinencia: los Católicos mayores de 14 años deben abstenerse de comer carne el Miércoles de Cenizas, el Viernes Santo y todos los viernes de Cuaresma. Los Católicos solo pueden reemplazar la abstinencia por otra forma de penitencia los días viernes fuera del tiempo de Cuaresma.

Ayuno: los Católicos entre 18 y 59 años deben ayunar el Miércoles de Cenizas y el Viernes Santo. En estos días se permite una comida completa y dos comidas pequeñas mas durante el día para mantener la fortaleza necesaria y de acuerdo a las necesidades físicas de cada persona. Estas dos comidas juntas no deben ser equivalentes a una comida completa. No está permitido comer entre comidas; si se puede tomar líquidos, leche o jugos.

Sacramento de la penitencia: todos los fieles que han alcanzado la edad de razonamiento (segundo grado) deben confesar fielmente sus pecados graves al menos una vez al año. La Cuaresma es un buen tiempo para cumplir este precepto de la Iglesia. Toda persona que sabe que ha cometido un pecado mortal, no debe recibir la Sagrada Comunión sin acudir antes a la confesión sacramental (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica # 1457). Se recomienda la confesión frecuente de los pecados veniales para crecer en la gracia de Dios (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica # 1458).

Otras observaciones durante el tiempo de Cuaresma: los días de cada semana de Cuaresma, con excepción de las Solemnidades, son días obligatorio de penitencia y se deben observar con oraciones y un aumento en la devoción de las prácticas espirituales. Algunas recomendaciones para cumplir con esta obligación incluye: atender la misa diaria, aumentar el tiempo de oración personal o de estudio de la fe, hacer voluntariamente mas días de ayuno y abstinencia, aumentar las obras de caridad, dar con generosidad a programas que ayudan a los demás, especialmente a los pobres y participar en las tradicionales devociones de Cuaresma (Vía Crucis, Rosario, retiros, misiones parroquiales, etc.)

El objetivo de observar estas devociones y prácticas es la conversión de nuestros corazones. Como lo dice el Catecismo, “la conversión interior impulsa a la expresión de esta actitud por medio de signos visibles, gestos y obras de penitencia” (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica # 1430) Estas penitencias nos ayudan a “arrepentimos” como nos pide el Señor, y a dirigir nuestra vida hacia Dios y lejos del pecado y del mal que lastiman nuestra naturaleza (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica # 1430-1439)

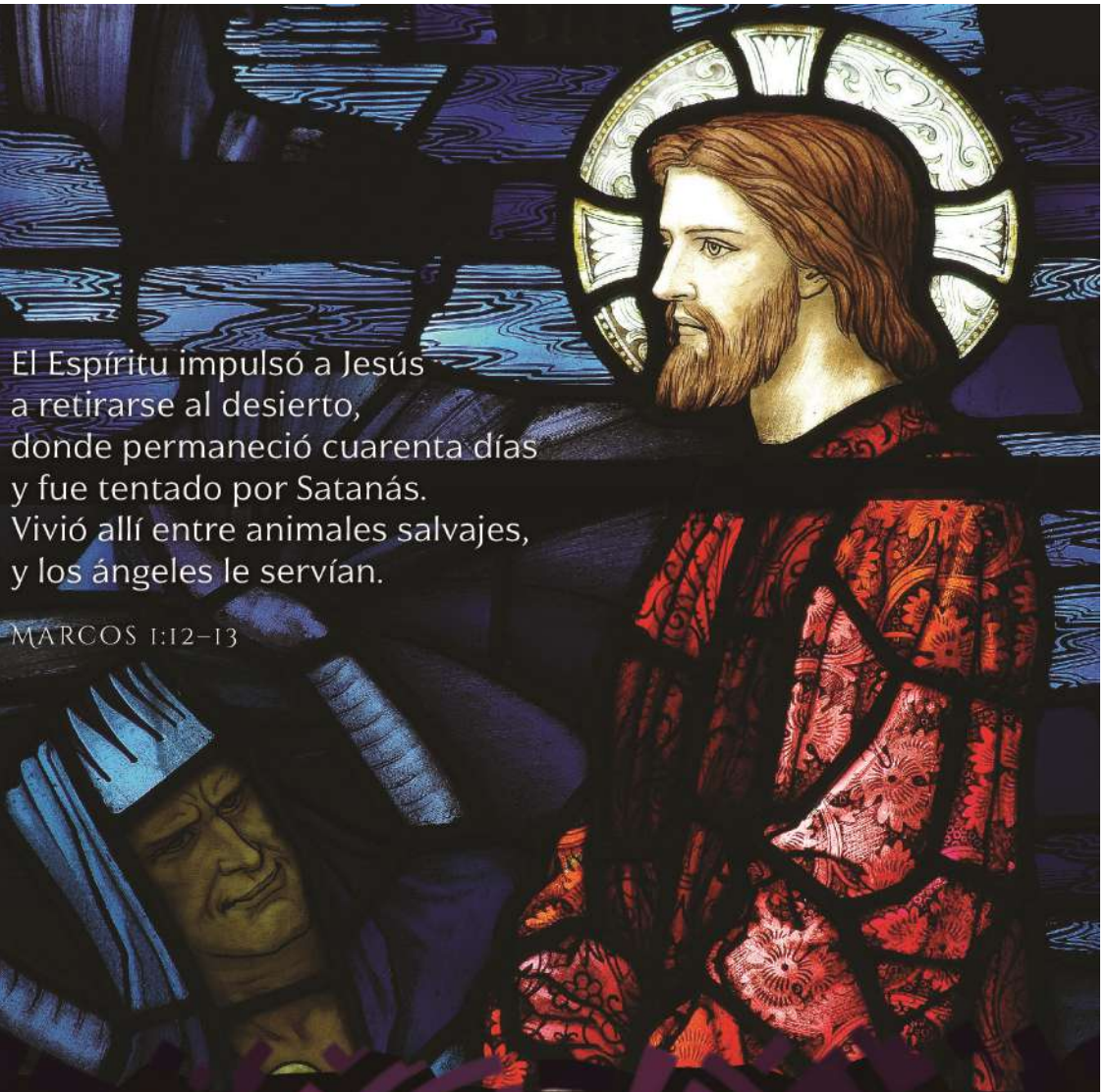
