



FROM THE PASTOR

What's New for Holy Week?



Dear Friends in Christ.

At every Mass we celebrate our Lord's offering of himself through his passion, death, and resurrection. The reality of the paschal mystery is made present by the reality of sharing in his body and blood. During Holy Week we celebrate this central mystery of our faith most intensely as we recall the final historical events of Jesus leading up to his resurrection. But is history the central focus of our celebration during the Triduum? Not really in the sense that we do not recreate or dramatically reenact the scenes of the upper room, the Garden of Gethsemane, Calvary or at the tomb. Jesus' life, ministries of healing and teaching, and his road to Calvary took place in a specific province of the Roman Empire at a specific time in history.

His call to love God and our neighbor, his proclamation of God's reign, and his total gift of himself poured out on the cross all took place in a historical time and place. These faith-anchoring events cannot be repeated or reenacted. Rather our faith tells us that they pass over into the mystery of the Church's liturgical

and sacramental celebrations. When we celebrate Holy Week we celebrate mystery, not history. We spiritually enter into the experience of the Paschal mystery so that the mystery happens among us as a people called to conversion and holiness. May our celebration allow God to take possession of our hearts as we seek to serve Him and our neighbor as a community of faith!

Palm Sunday

Since the beginning of Lent we have prepared our hearts by penance and charitable works. On Palm Sunday we gather together to herald with the whole Church the beginning of the celebration of our Lord's passion and resurrection. We commemorate the Lord's entry into the city of Jerusalem for our salvation, following his footsteps, so that, being made by his grace partakers of the Cross, we may have a share also in his Resurrection and in his life.

We will bless our palm branches by gathering in the back parking lot before the 10:00 AM Mass. We will follow Jesus' footsteps in a spiritual way as we process into the church.

Holy Thursday

Please join us for Morning Prayer of the Liturgy of the Hours, which will be prayed in the church at 8:00 AM Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. This is the official prayer of the Church which marks each day. In place of morning Masses we will have this prayer which is based on the psalms. Priests and Religious vow to pray this prayer several times per day. Yet, it is really meant to be the prayer of the whole church. This will be a great way to spiritually enter into this, the most holy time of the year.

In the Mass of the Lord's Supper we are spiritually brought back to the time when Jesus gave us the great gift of his very self, his body and blood. He is with us always and forever in the most intimate and humble way. This is our life, our source and our summit for the journey to the kingdom. Our Mass of the Lord's Supper will begin at 7:00 PM and it will be bilingual. Just before the Mass begins, we will have a Presentation of the Holy Oils. These oils will have been blessed that morning by our Archbishop and are used in celebrating the sacraments. For our offertory we will take up our collection for Bountiful Harvest this year. Because of the generosity of the Latino community in offering many hours of prayer, we will have a time of quiet prayer as our Lord is placed in the tabernacle at the Saint Joseph altar all the way through the night until Good Friday Morning Prayer.

Good Friday

On Good Friday we celebrate the Lord's Passion and we will do so as a bilingual celebration at 7:00 PM. We stand in awe of the love of our Lord poured out for us on the cross. Before the Adoration of the Cross our Liturgy of the Word will include the reading of our Lord's Passion. The intercessions will be universal. That is, they will be prayed in a sung manner by congregations around the world which we will take from the Roman Missal. Our Good Friday celebration is not a Mass. However, we will have Holy Communion from previously consecrated hosts from our Mass of the Lord's Supper.

After the liturgy, Adoration of the Cross will be extended. It will continue until 10:00 PM in the church. As we gather for Holy Saturday Morning Prayer, this will be another opportunity to sit before the Cross and adore it.

Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is the high point of our entire liturgical year in which we celebrate our Lord's resurrection. Our Easter Vigil Mass will begin this year at 8:30 PM. We will hear of God's covenantal love and salvation history proclaimed in the Liturgy of the Word. While we do not have Sacraments of Initiation this year for those entering the Church, we pray for those doing so around the world and we renew our own baptismal promises. Before the renewal we will relight our candles which will remind us that we have all received the light of Christ and it is only by this light that we live our lives of Christian faith.

Confirmation

This year we have two candidates for Confirmation. We will celebrate our Confirmations at the 10:00 AM Mass on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 11th. Please pray for Ashley and Chris, our Candidates.

I am truly looking forward to celebrating the Triduum liturgies with all of you for the first time. I have always felt that the experience brings me closer together with everyone and all of us closer to each other. May God bless your Holy Week!

Sunday Readings March 28, 2021 Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Reading 1 Is 50:4-7

The Lord GOD has given me a well-trained tongue,

that I might know how to speak to the weary a word that will rouse them. Morning after morning he opens my ear that I may hear; and I have not rebelled, have not turned back.

I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting. The Lord GOD is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame.

Reading 2 Phil 2:6-11

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

Because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Gospel Mk 14:1—15:47

As soon as morning came, the chief priests with the elders and the scribes, that is, the whole Sanhedrin held a council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" He said to him in reply, "You say so." The chief priests accused him of many things. Again Pilate questioned him, "Have you no answer? See how many things they accuse you of." Jesus gave him no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now on the occasion of the feast he used to release to them one prisoner whom they requested. A man called Barabbas was then in prison along with the rebels who had committed murder in a rebellion. The crowd came forward and began to ask him to do for them as he was accustomed. Pilate answered, "Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?" For he knew that it was out of envy that the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate again said to them in reply, "Then what do you want me to do with the man

you call the king of the Jews?" They shouted again, "Crucify him." Pilate said to them, "Why? What evil has he done?" They only shouted the louder, "Crucify him." So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas to them and, after he had Jesus scourged, handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away inside the palace, that is, the praetorium, and assembled the whole cohort. They clothed him in purple and, weaving a crown of thorns, placed it on him. They began to salute him with, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and kept striking his head with a reed and spitting upon him. They knelt before him in homage. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, dressed him in his own clothes, and led him out to crucify him.

They pressed into service a passer-by, Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross.

They brought him to the place of Golgotha —which is translated Place of the Skull — They gave him wine drugged with myrrh, but he did not take it. Then they crucified him and divided his garments by casting lots for them to see what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." With him they crucified two revolutionaries, one on his right and one on his left. Those passing by reviled him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself by coming down from the cross." Likewise the chief priests, with the scribes, mocked him among themselves and said, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also kept abusing him.

At noon darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon.

And at three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which is translated, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Some of the bystanders who heard it said, "Look, he is calling Elijah."

One of them ran, soaked a sponge with wine, put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink saying, "Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to take him down."

Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

Here all kneel and pause for a short time.

The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. When the centurion who stood facing him saw how he breathed his last he said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!"






