#### The Lord of History



Bethlehem is a difficult place. The city of Jesus' birth has long been and still is powerless, and today, caught in the conflict between Israel and the Palestinians. He whose birth we are celebrating at Christmas was also powerless. It was the Emperor Augustus who had the power. He was the ruler of the greatest empire in the world at the time. And he needed a great deal of money for its powerful military, so he had tax rolls drawn up throughout the whole empire, even in Israel, which was under Roman rule.

Many of the Jewish people refused to pay taxes to the emperor and formed organizations which either passively or actively resisted the authorities of occupation. These "zealots" repeatedly tried to minimize the occupying power and for this the Romans took cruel revenge and many ended up on the cross.

Joseph was not one of them. He obeyed the emperor's command and did what had to be done. Even though his wife was in the later stages of pregnancy, he undertook with Mary the long and difficult journey to Bethlehem in order to be enrolled in the census. He submitted to the emperor's rule. Yet the emperor was subject to God's rule. The emperor's life, like anyone's was in God's hands. Thus, it is God Himself who arranged that Joseph would travel to Bethlehem and that Mary would give birth to Jesus in that city from which the prophets foretold the Savior would come. And then Joseph could not find even a place to stay. Only a manger and swaddling clothes would be the clothing and shelter for the child. Our Lord came into the world in extreme poverty and powerlessness.

Why did God choose this way? First, to speak to our hearts. A little child always moves hearts. God does not want to dominate us like other kings of the world. He wants the love of our hearts. His love for us is deeply personal. This is why he stretches out to us the arms of a child. Second, he does not want us to encounter one another in a threatening way, striking attitudes of power, but serving one another. God makes himself small in Christ, so we should not make ourselves out to be too great.

In a world where there is much of the experience of Bethlehem of sorrow, violence, and injustice, is there hope? Is there a great joy? Can angels proclaim peace on earth? We must bend down to the child in the crib this Christmas and beyond. We must do so to encounter him personally, his humility, his peace, his plea to embrace our own humanity in each other and value each person we encounter as precious in his eyes. Then we will find peace and joy.

Take the time to read the gospel of the Nativity, Luke 2: 1-14, even aloud, and reflect on it again, if you can, this Christmas.

**Latino Ministry** It is with joy and thanksgiving that we share some of the Latino Ministry news! On May 30, 2021, the Latino Ministry at Guardian Angels hosted a family celebration after Sunday Mass. It was a joyful gathering where parishioners and faith formation families celebrated the 24 youth that received their sacraments. This celebration also marked the beginning of "summer missions" - a time to send out the disciples that attended the School of Evangelization led by Fr. Joseph Williams, now Bishop-elect Williams! Five parishioners invited friends and families into their homes to welcome and host these missionaries sent by Guardian Angels. During these gatherings, one missionary presented a reflection on either the parable of the Prodigal Son or the Lost Sheep and then another missionary offered their testimony of encountering Christ. Prayer, worship, hospitality and fellowship were also part of the gathering. Those attending the open house were invited to join or rejoin Guardian Angels and to register their children to faith formation classes. Two catechumens, four First Communion and two Confirmation students from these open houses are attending sacramental preparation at Guardian Angels this year. On Sunday August 1, 2021 at the Spanish Mass we celebrated the "Yo Soy Misionero" Sunday (I am a Missionary Sunday). At this Mass, parishioners were invited to respond to the missionary call they received at their baptism by inviting a friend, relative or neighbor, to register their children for sacramental preparation. Parishioners took home a Yo Soy Misionero card and after making a personal invitation, they completed the card and returned it to the parish for a follow up call. Jose Luis and Zulma invited their neighbor Fortina. Fortina's two children are attending First Communion classes. Herminia invited her sister Lilia; Lilia's two children are in First Communion classes this year. Julia invited her friend Alejandra; Alejandra's son is a catechumen attending catechesis at Guardian Angels. Antonia, invited her two neighbors Liliana and Miriam, both registered their children in First Communion and Confirmation classes this year. Guardian Angels is blessed by this missionary response! On Sunday August 29, 2021, with a Mass at Chaska City Square Park, we celebrated the fruits of the summer missions and invited families to attend Encounter - an adult faith formation program in Spanish. Since September 15, 2021, thirty -eight parents and their children are coming to Encounter on Wednesday nights. While children attend faith formation classes, parents meet in small groups and are led and cared for by small group leaders. At Encounter, parents receive formation to increase their knowledge of the Catholic faith so as to deepen their relationship with our loving Father. We thank God for the eleven Latino leaders that dedicate their time and talents on Wednesday nights to serve these families and to accompany them to an encounter with Christ. Our Latino parishioners are also blessed with two opportunities to come closer to Jesus in prayer; all day Eucharistic Adoration on Thursday and the Charismatic Prayer Group on Thursday evenings. Ten Latino adorers spend an hour adoring the Lord on Thursdays and an average of fifteen people come to the prayer group on Thursday evenings. The Latino community is hungry for good news and is waiting to be encountered by the Church. At Guardian Angels, we are blessed by faithful parishioners who have expe-

rienced the love and healing power of Jesus and have the de-

sire to go out as missionary disciples to present the Good News of Jesus Christ. We will continue to form and send our missionaries, and we will pray for the Holy Spirit's guidance as we reach out to the Latino Community in the Chaska-Carver area. Merry Christmas! May Jesus find a place in our hearts and a home in our homes. - Viviana Sotro

#### **Reasons for Hope**

Dear Parishioners and friends,

Merry Christmas to you all and happy new year! Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us! At Guardian Angels and Saint Nicholas we have reasons for hope. We have shown resiliency in these times of covid and of our school closure. In spite of these adversities, we have re-established Sunday Mass at Saint Nicholas with the help of the services of Father Jim Devorak. We had a very nice Guardian Angels parish festival, we have added a new parent and adult faith formation called Encounter, and we now look forward to meeting,

welcoming and working with two new staff members. We had 51 English-speaking and 37 Spanish speaking participants in our Archdiocesan Synod small group discussions about how we can be a lively, inviting, attractive, and young church. We have indeed had a continuation of about 30-35 baptisms per year and several new parishioners. To those who are new, we welcome you to our parishes! If you would like to be on a new baptism team or new parishioner welcome team, please let me know.

As you know, we are proposing to sell our former convent and school buildings and renovate our former friary building at Guardian Angels. Through discussions that I have had with a good number of parishioners and with the Finance Council, Parish Pastoral Council,

and Maintenance Committee, I have come to believe that we cannot continue to under-utilize our buildings and allocate resources to maintain all of them as they currently exist. We must re-purpose our buildings which were built many years ago for active ministries. I believe that this will prove to be a prudent use of our resources.

Please come to our All-parish (town hall) meeting on Thursday, January 13<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 PM in the Saint Francis Hall. We want to present the facts to date, to allow you to stay informed, and to answer questions and allow for your reaction to the proposal. We are making efforts to match the proceeds from the sale of the school and former convent buildings to the cost to renovate the friary in such a way as to allow for everything that we would want. As of this writing, this is proving to be a challenge and will most likely cost more. I anticipate that we will, in time, present options and stages of development of the former friary. Thus, your input will be very important. However, I wish to allow for this input to be given in subsequent meetings. The main goal of this first meeting is to present the facts and allow time to reflect upon the options at hand before we discuss them more considerably.

We have secured the services of real estate brokers at Cushman and Wakefield, and Mr. Chuck Biechler, attorney of Meier, Kennedy, and Quinn law firm to help us with the sale. We have received first drafts of drawings from Vanman Architects and Builders which the Maintenance Committee has reviewed and offered considerable feedback.

When we did a walk-through with representatives from Vanman, it was pretty exciting to imagine the possibilities and to see how the multi-floor space could be utilized. It actually seemed surprisingly ample when we walked through it. I look forward to sharing this vision with you of the former friary and ultimately our whole parish with you on January 13<sup>th</sup>.

May Jesus born among us lead us to His will in this discernment for our community that will have lasting impact for our future. God bless you this Christmas season! - Father Tony






#### VIDA FAMILIAR

#### El señor de la Historia

Belén es un lugar difícil. La ciudad del nacimiento de Jesús ha sido y sigue siendo un lugar sin poder y hoy está atrapada en el conflicto entre Israel y los palestinos. Aquel cuyo nacimiento celebramos en Navidad tampoco tenía el poder, era el emperador Augusto quien tenía el poder. Era el gobernante del imperio más grande del mundo en ese momento. Y necesitaba una gran cantidad de dinero para su poderoso ejército, por lo que hizo que se redactaran listas de impuestos en todo el imperio, incluso en Israel, que estaba bajo el dominio romano.

Muchos judíos se negaron a pagar impuestos al emperador y formaron organizaciones que resistieron pasiva o activamente a las autoridades. Estos "fanáticos" intentaron en repetidas ocasiones minimizar el poder de los invasores y por ello, los romanos se vengaron cruelmente y muchos terminaron en la cruz.

José no era uno de ellos. Obedeció la orden del emperador e hizo lo que tenía que hacer. A pesar de que su esposa estaba en los últimos días del embarazo, emprendió con María el largo y difícil viaje a Belén para inscribirse en el censo. Se sometió al gobierno del emperador. Sin embargo, el emperador estaba sujeto al gobierno de Dios. La vida del emperador, como la de cualquiera, estaba en manos de Dios. Por lo tanto, fue Dios mismo quien dispuso que José viajara a Belén y que María diera a luz a Jesús en esa ciudad de donde los profetas predijeron que vendría el Salvador. Y luego José no pudo encontrar ni un lugar donde quedarse. Solo un pesebre y pañales serían la ropa y el refugio del niño. Nuestro Señor vino al mundo en extrema pobreza e impotencia.

¿Por qué Dios quiso que fuera de esta manera? Primero, para hablar directamente a nuestro corazón. Un niño pequeño siempre mueve corazones. Dios no quiere dominarnos como otros reyes del mundo. Quiere el amor de nuestros corazones. Su amor por nosotros es profundamente personal. Por eso nos tiende los brazos de un niño. En segundo lugar, no quiere que nos encontremos unos con otros de forma amenazadora, con actitudes de poder, sino sirviéndonos unos a otros. Dios se hace pequeño en Cristo, por eso nosotros no nos debemos hacer demasiado grandes.

En un mundo donde existe mucho de la experiencia de dolor, violencia e injusticia que se vive en Belén, ¿hay esperanza? ¿Puede haber una gran alegría? ¿Pueden los ángeles proclamar la paz en la tierra? Debemos inclinarnos hacia el niño en la cuna esta Navidad y aun debemos hacer mas, debemos encontrarnos con él personalmente, su humildad, su paz, su súplica de abrazar nuestra propia humanidad en los demás y valorar a cada persona que encontramos como preciosa a sus ojos. Entonces encontraremos paz y alegría.

Esta Navidad, tome tiempo para leer el evangelio de la Natividad, Lucas 2: 1-14, incluso en voz alta, y una vez más reflexione con esta Palabra.

El Papa Francisco nombró esta mañana al Padre Joseph Williams, sacerdote de la Arquidiócesis de Saint Paul y Minneapolis, como obispo auxiliar de la Arquidiócesis de Saint Paul y Minneapolis. El obispo electo Williams es actualmente el pastor de la Iglesia de San Esteban y la Iglesia del Santo Rosario, ambas en Minneapolis, Minnesota. El Padre Williams también sirve como Vicario para el Ministerio Latino de la Arquidiócesis. Nativo de Stillwater, Minnesota, el obispo electo Williams, de 47 años, obtuvo una licenciatura en biología de la Universidad de Minnesota, Morris. Luego se matriculó en la Universidad Franciscana de Steubenville en Steubenville, Ohio, donde, en un ambiente de oración y apoyo fraterno, escuchó el llamado de Dios al sacerdocio. Fue aceptado en el Seminario Saint Paul en St. Paul, Minnesota, en 1998. El obispo electo Williams fue ordenado sacerdote para la Arquidiócesis de Saint Paul y Minneapolis en 2002. Después de la ordenación, el obispo electo Williams sirvió en la Catedral de San Pablo, la parroquia Divina Misericordia en Faribault, San Matías en Hampton y Santa María en Nueva Tréveris. En 2008, fue designado para servir a la parroquia de Saint Stephen en Minneapolis. La parroquia del Santo Rosario se agregó a su pastoreo en 2020. El obispo electo Williams actualmente sirve en la junta de fideicomisarios de The Seminaries of Saint Paul en St. Paul, Minnesota. Se ha desempeñado como capellán de la Cámara de Representantes de Minnesota y como Coordinador de Alcance Arquidiocesano a Personas con Discapacidades. Como obispo auxiliar, el obispo electo Williams trabajará junto

con el arzobispo Bernard A. Hebda de Saint Paul y Minneapolis para dirigir la Iglesia en la arquidiócesis, que abarca el área metropolitana de 12 condados. "Me siento humildemente honrado por el nombramiento del Papa Francisco", dijo el obispo electo Williams. "Amo a Jesús y a Su Iglesia, y espero unirme a los fieles de Saint Paul y Minneapolis para compartir ese amor con nuestros vecinos, especialmente con los pobres y los inmigrantes. He tenido el privilegio de servir a nuestras hermanas y hermanos de habla hispana por más de 15 años. Su tierno amor a Dios y su devoción al sacerdocio me han inspirado a vivir mis votos diariamente. Confio en que el Espíritu Santo le mostrará al Arzobispo Hebda cómo puedo apoyarlo mejor en el cuidado de todas las personas maravillosas de esta Arquidiócesis. Por favor, oren por nosotros". El Arzobispo Hebda dijo: "Fue con gran alegría que me enteré del nombramiento del Papa Francisco del P. Joseph Williams como Obispo Auxiliar de Saint Paul y Minneapolis. Los sacerdotes y fieles de la Arquidiócesis deben estar honrados de que el Santo Padre haya elegido a un hijo nativo, nutrido, alimentado y formado en esta Iglesia local, para servir como Sucesor de los Apóstoles. Su profunda fe, su corazón pastoral, su amor por Cristo y su rebaño, y sus impresionantes dones naturales sugieren que el Señor lo ha estado preparando durante mucho tiempo para servir como obispo. Habiendo sido inspirado por su liderazgo en San Esteban y en Santo Rosario, su corazón por los pobres y los de la periferia, su celo evangélico y su liderazgo como Vicario para el Ministerio Latino, estoy particularmente encantado por el nombramiento y confio en que la Arquidiócesis se beneficiará enormemente de su ejemplo, discernimiento y liderazgo. Por favor, únase a mí en oración por el obispo electo Williams mientras se prepara para su ordenación el 25 de enero, la Fiesta de la Conversión de San Pablo, y al comenzar su servicio episcopal. Que Nuestra Señora de Loreto, en cuya fiesta fue nombrado, lo guíe siempre al corazón compasivo de su Hijo". El obispo electo Williams nació el 2 de mayo de 1974, hijo del Dr. Gary y Mary Williams. Es el tercero de nueve hijos, creció en Stillwater, asistió a la escuela Católica de Saint Croix y se graduó del secundario de Stillwater en 1992. Su hermano, el padre Peter Williams, también es sacerdote de la Arquidiócesis de Saint Paul y Minneapolis y se desempeña como párroco de la parroquia de Saint Ambrose en Woodbury. El obispo electo Williams se graduó summa cum laude de la Universidad de Minnesota, Morris, en 1996 y obtuvo un título en filosofía / preteología de la Universidad Franciscana de Steubenville en 1998. Obtuvo una Maestría en Divinidad del Seminario Saint Paul y fue ordenado el 25 de mayo de 2002 por el Arzobispo Harry J. Flynn. Su ordenación episcopal está programada para el 25 de enero de 2022 en la Catedral de San Pablo. La ordenación será transmitida en vivo en la página de Facebook de la Arquidiócesis de Saint Paul y Minneapolis. El arzobispo Hebda presentará hoy al obispo electo Williams en una conferencia de prensa a las 9 a.m. en la Catedral de San Pablo.
